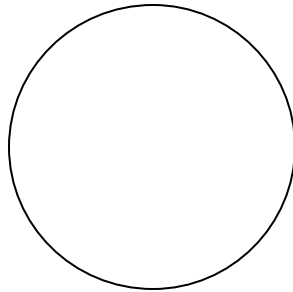


People, who would never dream of polluting a river or creek might pour antifreeze, fertilizer, paint, used motor oil or pet waste down storm drains. Even excessive amounts of grass clippings and leaves can pollute our water bodies.

What You Can Do To Help:

- ◆ Do not use the storm drainage system for disposing of motor oil, antifreeze, pesticides, paints, solvents or other materials.
- ◆ Sweep up leaves or grass clippings that accumulate on your driveway, sidewalk or in the street.
- ◆ Dispose of pet wastes by flushing them down the toilet or by burial.
- ◆ Redirect down spouts from paved areas to vegetated areas.
- ◆ Wash your car on the lawn-not the driveway.

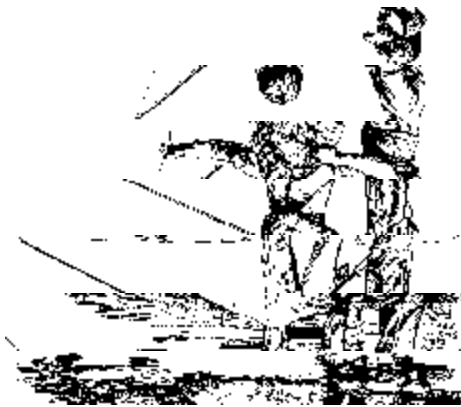
**Did You Know that...

It's true! Just take a walk down your street. Before long, you'll come to a storm drain, which are openings to our storm drainage canals. Any water that runs down this drain into the canals flow

directly into our waterways such as Turkey Creek and the Indian River Lagoon. **It does not pass through a treatment facility!**

This means that whatever we put down these storm drains winds up in the rivers and creeks where we go fishing, boating, swimming and eventually drink!
